### **Reflections from Pastor Barry**

Dear Friends at St. Stephen's,

Once again the poorest among us are being held hostage over politics. Feed the hungry is a mandate that Jesus repeats over and over again. There are no caveats and forms to fill out or requirements for those who are hungry. No, just feed them.

We are a great nation. I firmly believe this. But more than Americans we are Christians living in America. What makes us great is our ability to show compassion and to do so with wild abandon. This is what following Jesus looks like. We are our greatest when we are serving the least among us.

SNAP, the nationwide program for addressing poverty has been a remarkable program. 62% of households across the nation who receive SNAP benefits have children. Many who benefit are our senior citizens. 37% have a family member with disabilities. Nearly 2 million Pennsylvanians benefit from SNAP. Nearly 40% of recipients are employed but simply not making ends meet. Remember many who benefit are children. The cases of fraud involving SNAP is at about 1%. Only documented immigrants are eligible for the benefit. Those who receive the benefit- meager as it is- (about 6.00 dollars per person a day, only around 11 dollars a day per household)- are healthier, not burdening our overstretched health system, more awake and able to learn, better adjusted to navigate this crazy world of ours. Should we return to the tax credits offered the poor during COVID, the poverty rate among children would be cut nearly in half. There are countless stereotypes of folks who receive these benefits. The truth is that any of us, due to job loss or a health crisis or the death of the breadwinner in our household are closer to the poverty line that we might realize.

We do much here at St. Stephen's to feed the hungriest among us. I am so grateful for you all. As our celebration of Harvest Home approaches, we are indeed fortunate to not experience the hunger that so many of our fellow citizens live with and now more than ever as benefits are being cut and the process by which one receives them becoming ever more burdensome. The cost of SNAP is estimated to be about 1.5% of the overall budget. A very small price to pay for something with such great benefit. The truth is that even if you and I gave 100% more than we already are giving, we would not come

close to closing the gap created by the suspending of the SNAP benefits.

I am praying that as I write this, our nation will not allow 42 million of our citizens to scramble for a way to feed themselves let alone their children or their aging parents.

Feed the poor Jesus tells us. Feed them now. I always am thankful to you all for your generosity

Go in peace, remember the poor.

## **Voices of the Saints**

William Alfred Passavant was born in 1821

in Zelienople, Pennsylvania, he was a Lutheran minister who brought the Lutheran Deaconess movement to the United States. He is commemorated in the Calendar of Saints of the Lutheran Church on November 24.



Young Passavant crossed the Allegheny Mountains to attend Jefferson College in Canonsburg, Pennsylvania. Passavant taught Sunday school. After taking a year off from his studies due to the unexpected death of his brother. Passavant entered the Gettysburg Seminary. There, he continued his Sunday School work. He also asked for the Pennsylvania Bible Society, for funds for the Protestant mission in Cincinnati, Ohio.

Passavant was ordained in 1843,.He published the *Lutheran Almanac* a Sunday School hymn book. In 1844, Passavant accepted the call of a struggling Pittsburgh congregation: First English Evangelical Lutheran Church. During his time as their fifth pastor, he helped to increase the overall membership and steered the congregation towards public outreach. There Passavant organized the Pittsburgh Synod. By its second meeting, he had already established six Sunday schools, some with the help of other Protestant clergy.

While in Germany, Passavant met Pastor Theodore Fliedner who had opened a hospital and training school for deaconesses in Kaiserswerth. At Passavant's request, Fliedner brought four German deaconesses to Pittsburgh to work in the Pittsburgh Infirmary. Passavant founded many missions, and hospitals in Pittsburgh, Milwaukee, and Chicago, homes for epileptics in Jacksonville, Illinois, and Rochester, Pennsylvania, and an orphanage as well as an old peoples' home in New York. Beginning in 1866, Passavant and Louis Thiel worked to establish Thiel College. One of the last institutions Passavant founded was the Chicago Lutheran Theological Seminary. Many of the social welfare institutions Passavant founded would later join as the Lutheran Services in America, the largest church social program in the United States.

The house in which Passavant was born, Passavant House, is now Zelienople's local history museum and listed on the National Register of Historic Places.

## **Voices of the Saints**

<u>Ludwig Ingwer Nommensen</u> (1834 – 1918) was a Danish Lutheran missionary to Batak lands, North Sumatra who also translated the New Testament into the native Batak language and the first bishop of the Batak Christian Protestant Church. He is considered one of the greatest missionaries of all time.. He is commemorated as a missionary on November 7 in the Calendar of Saints of the Lutheran Church.



Nommensen was born in the Nordstrand peninsula. In 1846, a horse cart rolled over his legs, crushing them. The initial prognosis was that he would be unlikely to walk again. After praying for recovery, some three years later, he was indeed ready to walk.

An interest in Christian missionary work led to Nommensen's enrollment at the Rhenish Missionary Society. He was sent as a missionary to Sumatra in 1862. His first mission station was in the Silindung Valley. He experienced initial difficulties, but later succeeded in converting several local chiefs and their followers to Christianity. At first, most converts had to leave their villages and come to live with Nommensen in his Village of Peace. In 1878 he completed the first translation of the New Testament into the Batak language.

In that same year, Nommensen and his fellow missionaries, were involved in negation with the Native people and the Dutch army. Nommensen played a prominent role in serving the colonial army as an interpreter and cultural consultant.

In 1890, he moved north. Nommensen remained successful in building an indigenous Batak church. By the time of his death the church numbered 180,000 members, with 34 Batak pastors and 788 teacher-preachers. Today most Toba Batak Christians belong to the Batak Christian Protestant Church one of the largest Lutheran church denominations in Southeast Asia.

#### **ROOF REPLACEMENT FUND**
